Barney and Stovall's relationship also helped them work together as a team. Stovall said, "We didn't know each other at first but we got really close and worked good together as a team."

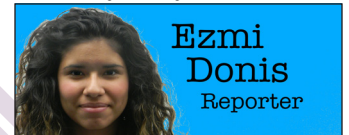
The girls worked really hard to prepare for state. Topham said, "We practiced every day and went with a mind set that we would win."

From the first tee to the eighteenth green the astounding Dixie High's Boys Golf team proved they have certainly been working on both their physical and mental game at the Utah State Competition.

The Competition this year was held at Dixie's home course, Sunbrook Golf Course. The boys team placed second in State overall and both Nick Britt and Taylor Yardley placed in the top ten individually. Nick Britt said, "We placed a lot better this year than I thought we would, I am happy about it."

After the loss of graduating Seniors, Cameron Hamill and AJ Orchard last May, and losing Drew Bailey to baseball, the rest of the team had to step up to fill their big shoes.

After Desert Hills winning Region the past two years, Dixie waits until the big tee off to play their best golf. Finishing second behind the northern golf powerhouse, Park City, again for the past two seasons.

With two all-state golfer Yardley and Britt leading the charge, the team shot a 305-314 for a total 619 finishing two strokes ahead of Desert Hills, who finished in third.

Yardley placed 4th going 72-75 for a 147 total. He was five shots off of the state medalist, Park City's Mitchell Schow.

Miller would score another touchdown with a 39-yard run with four minutes left in the half. Senior Ammon Takau would also run the ball to paydirt for a 19-yard touchdown. Dixie would go into the locker room with a 21-3 lead.

Hall. He stripped the Redmen of the handoff and ran the ball back 44 yards before getting tackled.

"Our offense has consistently put up points," said defensive coordinator Wayne Alofipo, "But our defense has gelled the last few games and played

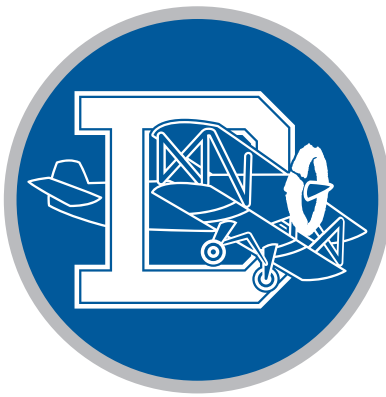
Recognizing the immense change switching schools by country, Yadi explained that

The final touchdown of the night was a hookup between Takau and McLane Keenan from four yards out for the final score, 42-10. The Flyers defense came away four fumbles, an interception, and a Cedar handoff to Chris Hall, while only giving up 10 points.

"We never planned on running the ball as much as we did tonight," said head coach, Blaine Monkres, "But in the first half they were playing their nickel package and daring us to run. Cedar reversed that in the second half so we passed the ball more."

Football players will respond with whoever plays them the

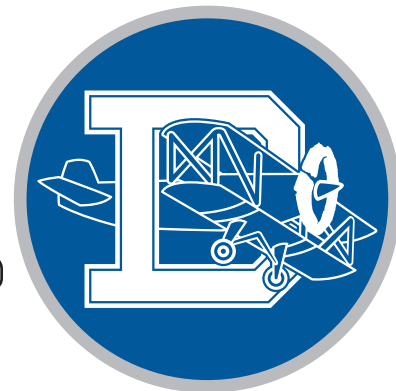
toughest, "Our big rivals, Pine View and Desert Hills, are always teams to compete with," commented Emilio Gutierrez.

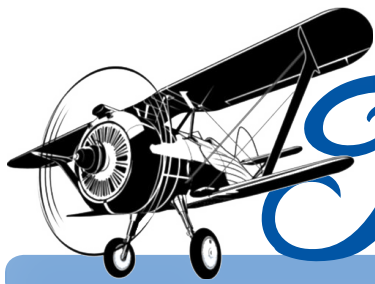

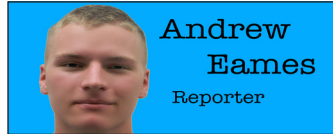

ART OF THE BEAT

Nearly everybody knows what beatboxing is; drum beats and sounds being replicated through the mouth to make rhythms and music.

Beatboxing is often seen as just an amusement and nothing to be taken seriously, it's a party trick. In other parts of the world, however, beatboxing is a very widespread form of art used to express songs and emotion like singing or playing an instrument.

Where did this musical art-form originate from anyway?

Beatboxing goes back even before the first languages arrived, before words were used to communicate. In that time noises were the primary form of communication between humans in the pre-historic era.

A theory that suggests this is known as the cuckoo theory where humans would imitate

the sounds of other animals around them.

So how do the twenty-six natural sounds emitted from human vocal cords (the alphabet) become a musical tool of expression? It's simple, every person has three sounds that are already percussive in nature: "B", "T", and "K".

The sound is then non-vocalised meaning using air rather than voice to produce it. Put them in a simple pattern with

beats (B), offbeats (K), and subdivisions with a high-hat (T).

This is just scratching the surface. Sound effects, vocalisation, irregular patterns, looping and more are all part of the bigger picture.

An example of the introduction of beatboxing into mainstream culture would be the increased use of beatboxers in acapella groups. Justin Timberlake is even known to in-

corporate vocal percussion into some of his songs that can be heard to the trained ear.

Senior Nick Csere states beatboxing has influenced a huge part of his life. "It is a way to
