HANGIN' TOUGH



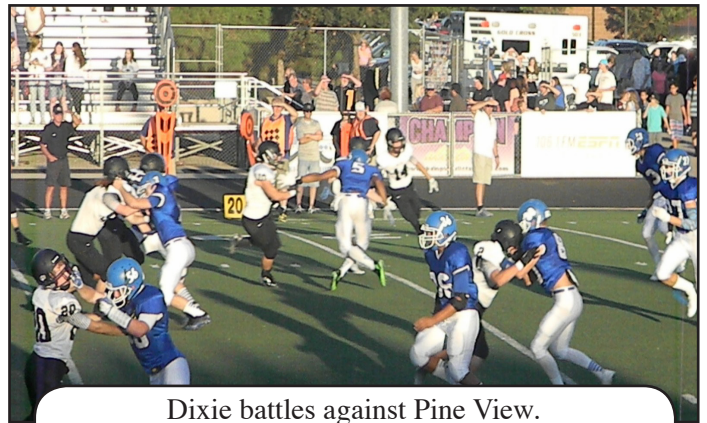

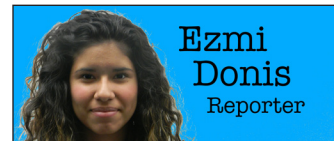
overused are trashing rooms or cars. “Out of all the fish in the sea will you go to blah blah with me” is what Jordan declared overrated.

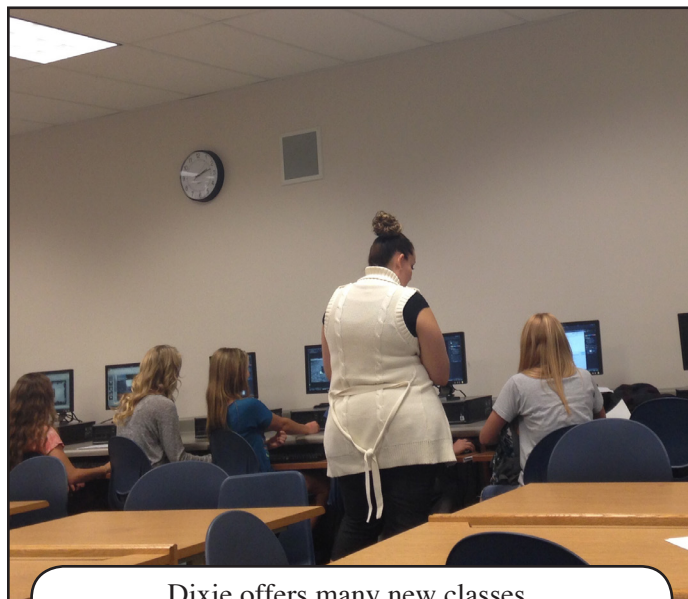
This year, Dixie High is giving students a chance to try something different with the addition of some new classes.
